



Fire training totaled 37,638 hours during the year. Emergency Medical training totaled over 9,195 hours.

In 2010 there was an increase in training for the department with 2 recruit classes training 19 new Fire / EMS cadets. Each of these cadets received 480 hours of intense instruction over a 13 week period. All recruits then successfully completed the National Professional Qualifications Firefighter Level 1 and 2 testing process.

# **Community Involvement Projects**








