# Fire and EMS Training

In 2020 the department conducted 2 recruit classes with a total of 22 new cadets. Each of these recruit firefighters underwent 30 weeks of rigorous mental and physical challenges. All recruits then successfully completed the National Professional Qualifications Firefighter Level 1 and 2 testing process as well as National Certified Advanced EMT.

The Training Division produced several classes for new certification as well as required continuing education. These classes included Fire Apparatus Operator Certification, Fire Instructor 1, Fire Officer 1, and Fire Officer 2. Additionally, EMS Courses of Advanced Medical Life Support, Prehospital Trauma Life Support, Emergency Pediatric Care, and Basic Cardiac Life Support were conducted. All Fire and EMS classes are national certifications.







# **Emergency Management Agency**

Fayette County Emergency Management Agency is responsible for coordination, planning, and liaison activities with municipal, state, federal, private sector, and non-governmental organizations. Fayette County's ability to mitigate, prepare, respond, and recover from disasters while maintaining our eligibility for disaster assistance and reimbursement is at the maximum level allowed due to these efforts.

In cooperation with numerous community partners and all municipalities, Fayette County completed the five-year update of the Multi-Jurisdictional Hazard Mitigation Plan. This update was adopted by the county and all municipalities, and is a working document that assists with projects to lessen the impact of disasters on the community. It is reviewed annually to gauge progress in this effort, and can be amended to meet changing needs and hazards as they arise.

The major focus for this year has been the COVID-19 response. EMA has been in constant communication with the Georgia Department of Public Health and the Georgia Emergency Management Agency/Homeland Security to meet the needs of the public, as well as assisting both public and private partners with resource requests. Early shortages of both personal protective equipment and durable medical equipment required close coordination at the state and local levels to prioritize distribution of the limited supplies that were available. We're now working closely with our local health department to assist with facilities and personnel in the vaccination effort.

Other important activities and accomplishments for 2020 include:

Participation in three disaster exercises
Coordinated Hazard Mitigation grant applications
Coordinated maintenance and testing of the outdoor warning siren system
Assisted fire victims with liaison activities with the American Red Cross




# **Pandemic Response**

The COVID Pandemic that began in 2020 brought many challenges to the Department. The increase in call volume in the initial stages as well as the lack of available protective equipment tasked the organization with meeting these operational challenges with innovative ideas. The partnership with the District Health Department and GEMA allowed leverage in purchasing available supplies and equipment collaboratively with other counties and municipalities.

In December, the Department was asked to assist in the development and implementation of a Point of Distribution (POD) for the newly approved COVID vaccine. The Department met the challenge and engineered a solution utilizing a recently moved fire station in downtown Fayetteville. Paramedics from Fayette County Fire/EMS and surrounding municipalities partnered to deliver vaccines to the Public Safety and elderly community.







# **Bureau Of Fire Prevention**

The Bureau of Fire Prevention provides public education and awareness throughout the community and school system to help in the reduction of fire and life loss through life safety inspections, commercial building plan reviews, fire extinguisher training and fire investigations.

Our missions are achieved through the delivery of the 3<sup>rd</sup> grade Fire Safety Education Programs to the elementary schools in unincorporated Fayette County, public education to our county seniors through the Fayette County Senior Center and other organizations, and fire extinguisher training to the citizens and businesses of Fayette County.

Fire safety inspections are conducted on all businesses in unincorporated Fayette County as well as the Town of Brooks, Town of Woolsey and the Town of Tyrone. Plan reviews are conducted on all new structures built for Code Compliance and occupancy prior to construction and at completion.
