Hi Steve:

I will attempt to answer the questions raised in your email regarding our budget request.

New Admin Fee \$8,500: This is a fee charged by Prosecuting Attorney's Council for handling the payroll of our employees that are State Paid Circuit Reimbursed. They are the liason between our SPCR employees and the insurance companies and employee's retirement system. They generate paychecks, do the quarterly tax filing and prepare W-2s. Prosecuting Attorney's Council has provided this service free of charge for a number of years, but due to the volume they are now handling they have had to hire an employee to provide this service and are now passing on the costs to the DA's offices.

Caseload increase of 5% from 31.0% to 36.0% (Spalding down 4.6%)

Fayette's caseload has grown while Spalding's caseload has dropped

Fayette had an increase of 352 felonies while Spalding had a decrease of 450 felonies. Fayette had an increase of 215 misdemeanors while Spalding had a decrease of 12 misdemeanors.

Attorney deleted. This was as a result of last year's unfunded insurance increase.

Increases in salaries for all existing staff positions. Since our total salary request has dropped through attrition of higher paid and experienced attorneys, we have allocated some of the savings to other positions since it has been six years since any of our employees have had a pay increase.

Law Enforcement Liaison deleted - replace with Office Manager

Neither of these positions are new. The Office Manager position was State paid and the Law Enforcement Liaison was Circuit paid. These two positions were simply swapped.

Secretary deleted – replaced with investigator. This change was a shift of duties to better utilize our staff.

Retirement increase of 76%. When we prepared our budget request for FY 2013, the State provided us with the following percentages for benefits:

FY 2013

Retirement 11.63%

Insurance 27.363%

These figures are percentages of the employee's salaries.

In January, 2013, we were notified that insurance rates from July, 2012 thru December, 2012 were increased to 35%; for January and February, 2013, rates were 24% and March- June, 2013 rates woud be 25%. This computes to an insurance premium of 29.833% rather than

the 27.363 we requested. Retirement percentages did not change throughout the year.

That same January, 2013 correspondence notified us that the FY 2014 rates would be 18.46% for retirement and 30.781% for insurance effective July 1, 2013. There was no explanation for the reason for the increase, but I recently heard on the news that the State had some unfunded pension issues, so I suspect that to be the reason for the increase. This is only speculation however.

Hi Steve:

I will attempt to answer the questions raised in your email regarding our budget request.

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We are requesting additional funding for FY 2014 from each County. The total County funds needed from each County are minimum funding.

As most of you will remember when we submitted our funding requests for FY 2013, we included a request for an addition \$50,000 which represented the amount of the increase in our insurance, roughly a 33% increase over the previous fiscal year. None of the Counties were able to fund this increase, consequently we had to eliminate an attorney position to help defray this expense. Eliminating this position was in addition to positions eliminated in the past few years for another attorney, victim advocate and part-time secretary. This year our insurance coverage has again increased an additional 5% bringing our total insurance needs for FY 2014 of \$218,280.

In addition to the insurance increase, we also need additional funding to cover the increased cost of providing retirement for our employees. We experienced an increase in retirement costs bringing the total needed for retirement to \$122,514.

All of our operating expenses have grown over the years. The cost of the law publications that are essential for prosecution have tripled in the last three years. We have eliminated all the printed books that we can and utilize the internet where possible for research and trial preparation. We are continually looking for ways to cut costs. Copy paper and postage costs continue to climb, but we are scanning and emailing as much as possible to avoid increases there.

We are striving to provide the best possible service to our Counties in the most cost effective manner. We have not received an increase in funding for our offices since FY 2008; we have exhausted our cash reserves and simply cannot afford another cut in our funding.

Money Laundering RICO Initiative

Under the traditional approach to prosecuting financial crimes, we prove the crime and punish the offender with prison time, probation, fines, restitution or a combination of those remedies. Forfeiture of assets is usually reserved for drug cases and, even then, only the assets that are actually used in the commission of the crime are seized.

That traditional approach has ignored other tools that have long been at our disposal. Those tools include the Georgia money laundering statute and the RICO act.

Section 7-1-916 <u>OCGA</u> states: "All property of every kind used or intended for use in the course of, derived from, or realized through a transaction which in fact involves proceeds of unlawful activity specified in [the RICO act] or otherwise subject to the provisions of this article shall be subject to forfeiture to the state." Boiled down to the basics, the statute allows us to seize and forfeit any property that has been commingled with proceeds derived from illegal activity.

So, if a criminal obtains \$500 by illegal means and deposits it into a bank account with a substantially larger balance, we can seize the entire account.

I want to begin to utilize these tools so that we can (1) remove the profit-potential from criminals and thereby discourage the crime; (2) adequately punish criminals who are not deterred by the traditional approaches; and (3) assist overburdened taxpayers as we open up a new stream of revenue to partially fund local government operations.

The US Attorneys Offices have actively used the federal money laundering statutes for years. In Georgia, only a handful of district attorneys are using the Georgia versions of the statute and most of them are hiring private lawyers to do so. The six and sometimes seven-figure forfeitures that have resulted are evidence of both the need and the potential for this initiative.

These actions are very complicated and require quick action to meet statutory deadlines. Few prosecutors have the training or the time to successfully pursue RICO forfeitures. Our circuit has the opportunity to blaze a new trail. We have already identified several opportunities for seizures of hundreds of thousands of assets from criminals who are profiting from their crimes.

I am seeking funding for the unit that will begin to make RICO forfeitures a routine part of our efforts to protect the public. Any county that fully funds our basic needs and additionally contributes toward this unit will be awarded a share of the forfeiture proceeds (along with our office and the

participating law enforcement agency) from each RICO forfeiture, regardless of the jurisdiction. This is, of course, subject to the approval of the judge to whom the dispositional order is presented for signature.

For the approaching fiscal year, our basic needs from Fayette County are \$455,746 and the amount needed for the forfeiture unit is \$45,360.

Jail Cost Reduction Initiative

Jail costs are a concern for everyone. The problems of overcrowding are obvious. Not so apparent are the risks of considerable medical bills for certain inmates.

We have always tried to maintain an awareness of jail costs and to assist where we can. However, I believe we could be much more effective if I had a prosecutor whose primary assignment was to address these matters around the circuit.

If the idea appeals to the commission, I have calculated the pro rata shares of the counties.

For Fayette, we can target jail costs if our basic needs are met in the amount of \$455,746 and we receive an additional \$27,000 for the program
