Each property in Fayette County has a designated zoning district. The zoning district determines what type of residential or commercial use is allowed on site. If you are considering physical location for your business in **unincorporated** Fayette County, please check with **Fayette County Planning and Zoning** to verify your business is allowed at the location.

#### **Decide Your Business Name, NAICS Code, and Structure**

- Choose a Business Name

  - o (OPTIONAL) If you are not ready to register your business, you can reserve your business name with the Georgia Secretary of State for 30 days.

- Find Your North American Industry Classification System (NAICS) Code NAICS Look Up www.naics.com/search/
  - An NAICS Code (North American Industry Classification System) is used by government agencies to identify your line of business and activities. You can either search by keyword or browse by industry to determine the NAICS code that matches your business.

#### **Obtain Your Federal EIN**

An Employer Identification Number (EIN) is also known as a Federal Tax Identification Number and is used to identify a business entity. You need it to pay federal taxes and hire employees. You may need it to open a bank account, state tax accounts, and apply for business licenses, and permits. This is a free service offered by the Internal Revenue Service and you can get your EIN immediately.

### Open a Business Checking Account (optional)

• A business checking account may help separate your personal and business assets, simplify filing business taxes, and make it easier to manage business-related finances.

### Register for State and Local Taxes (may apply)

   Many businesses in Georgia are liable for payment of unemployment insurance taxes, even if they don't yet have employees.

All businesses located in <u>unincorporated</u> Fayette County must obtain an Occupational Tax Certificate before business commences. The Occupational Tax Certificate creates your Fayette County tax account.
