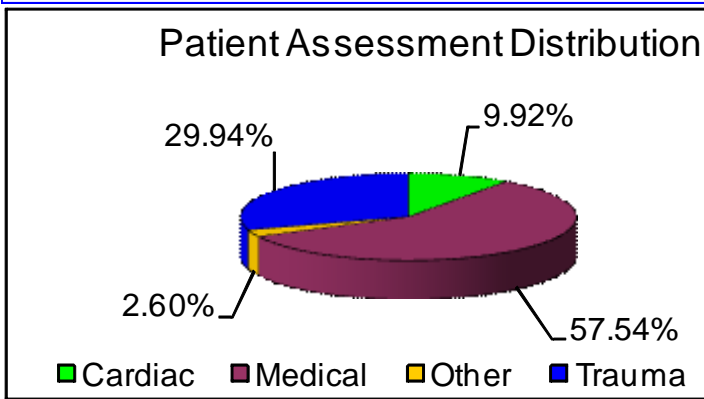

**Fire training** totaled 37,638 hours during the year.  
**Emergency Medical training** totaled over 9,195 hours.

In 2010 there was an increase in training for the department with 2 recruit classes training 19 new Fire / EMS cadets. Each of these cadets received 480 hours of intense instruction over a 13 week period. All recruits then successfully completed the National Professional Qualifications Firefighter Level 1 and 2 testing process.



During 2010, the establishment of the Tactical EMS program began. 8 personnel completed the 60+ hour training program to become certified "SWAT Medics". These specially trained paramedics serve as special resource personnel to the Fayette County Sheriff's Office.

Firefighters gave of their off duty time to provide assistance with the Toys for Tots program.



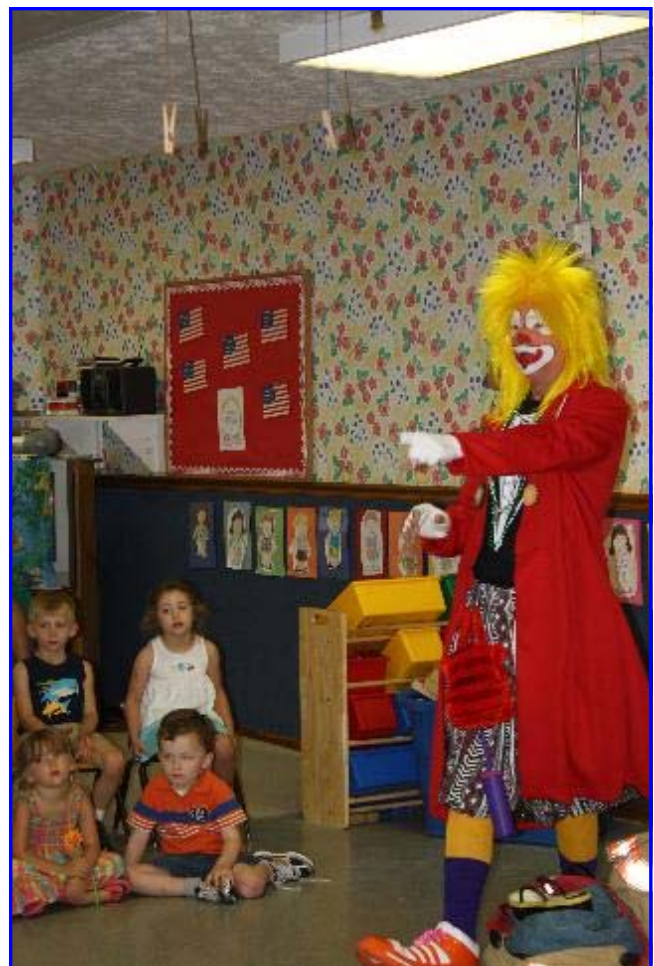

During 2010, the **Emergency Management** Division was successful in the development of the Fayette County Hazard Mitigation Plan. The plan includes a hazard analysis of both man-made and natural hazards and prioritizes mitigation goals and objectives. The plan exceeded all state and federal requirements for approval and will ensure compliance for future mitigation grant funding.
